THE SUNDAY OF THE PASSION

"Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life."

Today is the first day of Holy Week and the last Sunday in Lent, known as Palm Sunday or the Sunday of the Passion. The day begins by marking Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Many churches participate in the Liturgy of the Palms, first offered in The Episcopal Church in the 1960 Book of Offices. In this liturgy, the celebrant blesses palms or other branches, and, following a reading from the Gospels, leads the congregation in procession into their church—often singing "All Glory, Laud, and Honor" or "Ride On! Ride On In Majesty!"

This liturgy evokes the early observances of Palm Sunday. By the year 381, the faithful would process from the Mount of Olives into Jerusalem, waving palm or olive branches. As they processed, they sang songs from Scripture – including the exultant antiphon of Psalm 118 sung at Christ's entrance into the city: "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"

After the Liturgy of the Palms the tone of the service shifts noticeably. In contrast, Psalm 31, appointed for today, cries, "For I have heard the whispering of the crowd; fear is all around; they put their heads together against me; they plot to take my life." The Gospel reading is likewise sorrowful, recalling the events of Jesus' Passion (that is, the events and suffering before and during his death). Still, we are reminded throughout the difficult days ahead that this is not the end of the story. Despite the Savior's death on the cross, he promises to rise again. The Man of Sorrows remains the one at whose name, "every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, [and] every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:10-11).

May this sacred week be one that draws you into the loving heart of God.

GOSPEL OF THE LORD'S ENTRY INTO JERUSALEM

Matthew 21:1-11

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, "Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey." The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

Celebrant The Gospel of the Lord.

People Praise to you, Lord Christ.

BLESSING OF THE BRANCHES All hold up their branches.

Celebrant The Lord be with you. *People* **And also with you.**

Celebrant Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.People It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Celebrant It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit, now and for ever.

Amen.

Celebrant Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

People Hosanna in the highest.

THE PROCESSION

Celebrant Let us go forth in peace.

People In the name of Christ. Amen.

During the procession, all hold branches in their hands and wave them. Prior to entering the church, the procession halts while the following Collect is said

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The procession enters the church to find their seats.

Almighty and everliving God, in your tender love for the human race you sent your Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon him our nature, and to suffer death upon the cross, giving us the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of his suffering, and also share in his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death - even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

THE PASSION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO MATTHEW

The congregation remaining seated, the Passion Gospel is read in parts, led by a narrator who begins by saying: The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ According to Matthew. At the verse which mentions the arrival at the place that is called The Skull [Matthew 27:33], all stand.

Narrator The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ According to Matthew.

One of the twelve, who was called Judas Iscariot, went to the chief priests and said,

Reader I What will you give me if I betray him to you?

Narrator They paid him thirty pieces of silver. And from that moment he began to look for an

opportunity to betray him. On the first day of Unleavened Bread the disciples came

to Jesus, saying,

Reader II Where do you want us to make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?

Narrator Jesus said,

Jesus Go into the city to a certain man, and say to him, 'The Teacher says, My time is near;

I will keep the Passover at your house with my disciples.'

Narrator So the disciples did as Jesus had directed them, and they prepared the Passover

meal. When it was evening, he took his place with the twelve; and while they were

eating, he said,

Jesus Truly I tell you, one of you will betray me.

Narrator And they became greatly distressed and began to say to him one after another,

Reader II Surely not I, Lord?

Narrator Jesus answered,

Jesus The one who has dipped his hand into the bowl with me will betray me. The Son of

Man goes as it is written of him, but woe to that one by whom the Son of Man is

betrayed! It would have been better for that one not to have been born.

Narrator Judas, who betrayed him, said,

Reader I Surely not I, Rabbi?

Narrator Jesus replied,

Jesus You have said so.

Narrator While they were eating, Jesus took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it,

gave it to the disciples, and said,

Jesus Take, eat; this is my body.

Narrator Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, saying,

Jesus Drink from it, all of you; for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out

for many for the forgiveness of sins. I tell you, I will never again drink of this fruit of

the vine until that day when I drink it new with you in my Father's kingdom.

Narrator When they had sung the hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. Then Jesus

said to them,

Jesus You will all become deserters because of me this night; for it is written, 'I will strike

the shepherd, and the sheep of the flock will be scattered.' But after I am raised up, I

will go ahead of you to Galilee.

Narrator Peter said to him,

Reader II Though all become deserters because of you, I will never desert you.

Narrator Jesus said to him,

Jesus Truly I tell you, this very night, before the cock crows, you will deny me three times.

Narrator Peter said to him,

Reader II Even though I must die with you, I will not deny you.

Narrator And so said all the disciples. Then Jesus went with them to a place called

Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples,

Jesus Sit here while I go over there and pray.

Narrator He took with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and began to be grieved and

agitated. Then he said to them,

Jesus I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and stay awake with me.

Narrator And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed,

Jesus My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what

you Want.

Narrator Then he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter,

Jesus So, could you not stay awake with me one hour? Stay awake and pray that you may

not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.

Narrator Again he went away for the second time and prayed,

Jesus My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, your will be done.

Narrator Again he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy. So leaving them

again, he went away and prayed for the third time, saying the same words. Then he

came to the disciples and said to them,

Jesus Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? See, the hour is at hand, and the Son of

Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up, let us be going. See, my betrayer is

at hand.

Narrator While he was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve, arrived; with him was a large

crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests and the elders of the people.

Now the betrayer had given them a sign, saying,

Reader I The one I will kiss is the man; arrest him.

Narrator At once he came up to Jesus and said,

Reader I Greetings, Rabbi!

Narrator and kissed him. Jesus said to him,

Jesus Friend, do what you are here to do.

Narrator Then they came and laid hands on Jesus and arrested him. Suddenly, one of those

with Jesus put his hand on his sword, drew it, and struck the slave of the high

priest, cutting off his ear. Then Jesus said to him,

Jesus Put your sword back into its place; for all who take the sword will perish by the

sword. Do you think that I cannot appeal to my Father, and he will at once send me more than twelve legions of angels? But how then would the scriptures be fulfilled,

which say it must happen in this way?

Narrator At that hour Jesus said to the crowds,

Jesus Have you come out with swords and clubs to arrest me as though I were a bandit?

Day after day I sat in the temple teaching, and you did not arrest me. But all this has

taken place, so that the scriptures of the prophets may be fulfilled.

Narrator Then all the disciples deserted him and fled. Those who had arrested Jesus took him

to Caiaphas the high priest, in whose house the scribes and the elders had gathered. But Peter was following him at a distance, as far as the courtyard of the high priest; and going inside, he sat with the guards in order to see how this would end. Now the chief priests and the whole council were looking for false testimony against Jesus so that they might put him to death, but they found none, though many false

witnesses came forward. At last two came forward and said,

Reader II This fellow said, 'I am able to destroy the temple of God and to build it in three

days.'

Narrator The high priest stood up and said,

Reader I Have you no answer? What is it that they testify against you?

Narrator But Jesus was silent. Then the high priest said to him,

Reader I I put you under oath before the living God, tell us if you are the Messiah, the Son of

God.

Narrator Jesus said to him,

Jesus You have said so. But I tell you, From now on you will see the Son of Man seated at

the right hand of Power and coming on the clouds of heaven.

Narrator Then the high priest tore his clothes and said,

Reader I He has blasphemed! Why do we still need witnesses? You have now heard his

blasphemy. What is your verdict?

Narrator They answered,

Reader II He deserves death.

Narrator Then they spat in his face and struck him; and some slapped him, saying,

Reader II Prophesy to us, you Messiah! Who is it that struck you?

Narrator Now Peter was sitting outside in the courtyard. A servant-girl came to him and said,

Reader I You also were with Jesus the Galilean.

Narrator But he denied it before all of them, saying,

Reader II I do not know what you are talking about.

Narrator When he went out to the porch, another servant-girl saw him, and she said to the

bystanders,

Reader I This man was with Jesus of Nazareth.

Narrator Again he denied it with an oath,

Reader II I do not know the man.

Narrator After a little while the bystanders came up and said to Peter,

Reader I Certainly you are also one of them, for your accent betrays you.

Narrator Then he began to curse, and he swore an oath,

Reader II I do not know the man!

Narrator At that moment the cock crowed. Then Peter remembered what Jesus had said:

'Before the cock crows, you will deny me three times.' And he went out and wept bitterly. When morning came, all the chief priests and the elders of the people conferred together against Jesus in order to bring about his death. They bound him, led him away, and handed him over to Pilate the governor. When Judas, his

betrayer, saw that Jesus was condemned, he repented and brought back the thirty

pieces of silver to the chief priests and the elders. He said,

Reader I I have sinned by betraying innocent blood.

Narrator But they said,

Reader II What is that to us? See to it yourself.

Narrator Throwing down the pieces of silver in the temple, he departed; and he went and

hanged himself. But the chief priests, taking the pieces of silver, said,

Reader II It is not lawful to put them into the treasury, since they are blood money.

Narrator After conferring together, they used them to buy the potter's field as a place to bury

foreigners. For this reason that field has been called the Field of Blood to this day. Then was fulfilled what had been spoken through the prophet Jeremiah, 'And they took the thirty pieces of silver, the price of the one on whom a price had been set, on whom some of the people of Israel had set a price, and they gave them for the potter's field, as the Lord commanded me.' Jesus stood before the governor; and the

governor asked him,

Reader I Are you the King of the Jews?

Narrator Jesus said,

Jesus You say so.

Narrator But when he was accused by the chief priests and elders, he did not answer. Then

Pilate said to him,

Reader I Do you not hear how many accusations they make against you?

Narrator But he gave him no answer, not even to a single charge, so that the governor was

greatly amazed. Now at the festival the governor was accustomed to release a prisoner for the crowd, anyone whom they wanted. At that time they had a notorious prisoner, called Jesus Barabbas. So after they had gathered, Pilate said to

them,

Reader I Whom do you want me to release for you, Jesus Barabbas or Jesus who is called the

Messiah?

Narrator For he realized that it was out of jealousy that they had handed him over. While he

was sitting on the judgment seat, his wife sent word to him,

Reader II Have nothing to do with that innocent man, for today I have suffered a great deal

because of a dream about him.

Narrator Now the chief priests and the elders persuaded the crowds to ask for Barabbas and

to have Jesus killed. The governor again said to them,

Reader I Which of the two do you want me to release for you?

Narrator And they said,

Reader II Barabbas.

Narrator Pilate said to them,

Reader I Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?

Narrator All of them said,

All (yelling) Let him be crucified!

Narrator Then he asked,

Reader I Why, what evil has he done?

Narrator But they shouted all the more,

All (yelling) Let him be crucified!

Narrator So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he

took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying,

Reader I I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves.

Narrator Then the people as a whole answered,

Reader II His blood be on us and on our children!

Narrator So he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be

crucified. Then the soldiers of the governor took Jesus into the governor's

headquarters, and they gathered the whole cohort around him. They stripped him and put a scarlet robe on him, and after twisting some thorns into a crown, they put it on his head. They put a reed in his right hand and knelt before him and mocked

him, saying,

Reader II Hail, King of the Jews!

Narrator

They spat on him, and took the reed and struck him on the head. After mocking him, they stripped him of the robe and put his own clothes on him. Then they led him away to crucify him. As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross.

The Congregation Stands

And when they came to a place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull), they offered him wine to drink, mixed with gall; but when he tasted it, he would not drink it. And when they had crucified him, they divided his clothes among themselves by casting lots; then they sat down there and kept watch over him. Over his head they put the charge against him, which read, 'This is Jesus, the King of the Jews.' Then two bandits were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. Those who passed by derided him, shaking their heads and saying,

Reader I You who would destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! If you are the Son of God, come down from the cross.

Narrator In the same way the chief priests also, along with the scribes and elders, were mocking him, saying,

Reader II He saved others; he cannot save himself. He is the King of Israel; let him come down from the cross now, and we will believe in him. He trusts in God; let God deliver him now, if he wants to; for he said, 'I am God's Son.'

The bandits who were crucified with him also taunted him in the same way. From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice,

Jesus Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?

Narrator that is,

Narrator

Jesus My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

Narrator When some of the bystanders heard it, they said,

Reader I This man is calling for Elijah.

Narrator At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. But the others said,

Reader II Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him.

Narrator

Then Jesus cried again with a loud voice and breathed his last. At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom. The earth shook, and the rocks were split. The tombs also were opened, and many bodies of the saints who had fallen asleep were raised. After his resurrection they came out of the tombs and entered the holy city and appeared to many. Now when the centurion and those with him, who were keeping watch over Jesus, saw the earthquake and what took place, they were terrified and said,

Reader I

Truly this man was God's Son!

Narrator

Many women were also there, looking on from a distance; they had followed Jesus from Galilee and had provided for him. Among them were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James and Joseph, and the mother of the sons of Zebedee. When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named Joseph, who was also a disciple of Jesus. He went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus; then Pilate ordered it to be given to him. So Joseph took the body and wrapped it in a clean linen cloth and laid it in his own new tomb, which he had hewn in the rock. He then rolled a great stone to the door of the tomb and went away. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary were there, sitting opposite the tomb. The next day, that is, after the day of Preparation, the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered before Pilate and said,

Reader II

Sir, we remember what that impostor said while he was still alive, 'After three days I will rise again.' Therefore command the tomb to be made secure until the third day; otherwise his disciples may go and steal him away, and tell the people, 'He has been raised from the dead,' and the last deception would be worse than the first.

Narrator

Pilate said to them,

Reader I

You have a guard of soldiers; go, make it as secure as you can.

Narrator

So they went with the guard and made the tomb secure by sealing the stone.

The Congregation is seated for a period of extended silence in response to the Gospel.

Said in unison

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father.
Through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation
he came down from heaven:
by the power of the Holy Spirit
he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary,
and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son.

With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

In the course of the silence after each bidding, the People offer their own prayers, either silently or aloud.

I ask your prayers for God's people throughout the world; for Justin, Archbishop of Canterbury; Michael, our Presiding Bishop; Rob, our Bishop; Tammy, our Rector; Ashley, our Associate; and in the Diocesan Cycle of Prayer for the clergy and people of St. Christopher's Havelock; for this gathering; and for all ministers and people.

The Celebrant concludes the prayers by saying

Almighty God, the fountain of all wisdom, you know our necessities before we ask and our ignorance in asking: Have compassion on our weakness, and mercifully give us those things which for our unworthiness we dare not, and in our blindness we cannot ask; through the worthiness of your Son Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Silence may be kept.






